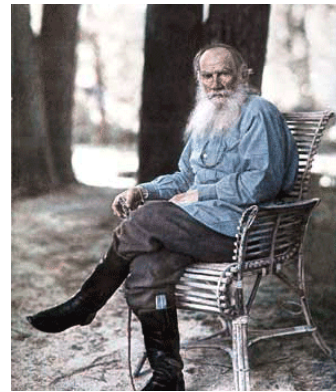
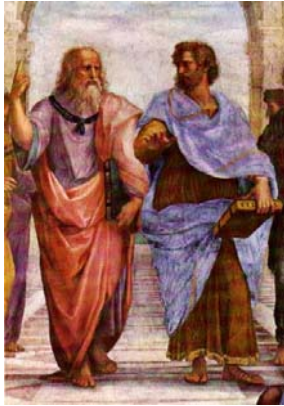


Old Thinkers Around Us
